Young man what does the Democracy offer as a reason why you should vote the Democratic ticket and embrace its faith. We are surprised that any Christian gentleman would be guilty of such falsehoods and deception, for such it is, as is well known, not only by the News, but by everybody else as well. A newspaper is not supposed to utter or give countenance to a falsehood for political purposes, no more than it would be expected to slander an honest man in business.

Marion Butler may be all that the News says of him, but we do not believe it, and we do not believe that the News believes it. However that may be, Marion Butler is not running for any office, and therefore is entitled to the respect accorded a private citizen. It may be time enough to say the things that are being said about him, if they must be said at all when Butler announces himself a candidate for office. If the Democratic party is without an issue in this campaign, save Marion Butler, they are in a bad way sure enough and deserve defeat. And if your party is as intellectual as you would have everybody believe, the Democratic party will be defeated, and the only thing to keep them from being defeated will be the very fact that they are not as intellectual as you represent them to be, and therefore are prejudiced and blinded, and continue to support the Democratic party because they are afraid of one lone man in the state, one Marion Butler, indeed the ground underneath and supporting the Democratic party must be shallow and tremb-

Infant Baptism.

State Dispatch:
Will you please give me a little space in your valuable columns, that the following questions and answers taken from the Christian Standard (Cincinnati):

First. What scripture can you give to prove children, infants, are not condemned if not baptised before they become moral agents?

Second. Does not David say we are born in sin?

Third. Does not Paul say that we are born in sin?

Fourth. Does not Paul say that we are born in sin?

These passages on us the burden of proving a negative, which goes beyond the demands of logic. The burden of proof is upon him who says an unbaptised infant dying in infancy is lost. But it is not difficult to prove this negative. In the first place the scriptures do not apply baptism to infants or any other person who cannot believe. Faith and baptism are indissolubly connected in the New Testament, the that believeth and is baptised shall be saved. (Mark 16-16.) But when they believed Phillips preaching the things concerning the kingdom of God, and the name of Jesus Christ, they were baptised both men and women. (Acts 8-12.)

In 1st Peter 3:21 Baptism said to be the answer (or seeking) a good conscience toward God. It is self evident that there can be no exercise in baptism on the part of an infant; hence baptism is not applicable to an infant. These passages and many others of like import, that it is not the duty of an infant to be baptised and that it does not sin in not being baptised and the idea of concerning a being for not doing what is impossible for him to do is simply absurd. Moreover the Bible said in speaking of infants: "Of such is the kingdom of heaven, and he tells us that men must turn and become as little children or they cannot enter the Kingdom of Heaven." (Matthew 18-3) Is an infant the Master makes a symbol of the Kingdom of Heaven to be condemned for not being baptised? When according to the scripture that its duty to be baptised, is it not possible to submit itself to be baptised? The question answers itself.

Does David not say he was born in sin? He says: "I was born in iniquity and in sin; my mother conceived me." The language is intensely personal and is no indication that it was intended to have a general application. David says that receiving him his mother said just what the circumstances were that made David's sin a matter largely of nature, but it does not teach that an infant was born a sinner and is under condemnation when born, grant that an infant is born in sin, and if a Priest baptising it, it would not pardon the sin or save it from sin, as it would have no violation or faith, and if by baptising would save it, it would be a baptism or water alone salvation. Such an idea is absurd in the extreme.

Yes, speaking of the Jews and Gentiles, Paul says all have sinned, using the verb in the active form, therefore, referring exclusively to sin committed by choice on the part of the sinner in the same connection the apostle says that sin is not imputed where there is no law, for sin is the

transgressed law. If sin is not imputed where there is no law, then an infant is not condemned, because it has no law and cannot transgress law.
