

at present on a salary basis, but the representatives of the county expect to pass laws at the present term of the Legislature putting all of them on the salary basis. Mr. J. J. Lattimore, register of deeds, saved the county \$206.05 during the month of December and says at least \$150 will be saved this month. He is getting a salary of \$150 a month. He took in fees amounting to \$356.06, for which amount he gave the treasurer a check and received in return his salary of \$150.

It is estimated that the county will be saved from \$,6000 to \$10,-000 when all officers are on a salary basis and the change in the register of deed's pay is so profitable a bill will be introduced putting them all on the same basis, though varying in amount.

"HILE Ahab was king of Israel. Jehoshaphat succeeded to the throne of Judah. He had the advantage that his parents were godly people-s great advantage. As suggested in our last study, the iniquity and idolatry of Israel reacted favorably upon Judah, just as the drunkenness and profligacy of s parent sometimes reacts upon his children, who perceive his folly and learn by his inistakes. Moreover the idolatry of Israel, which drove its most saintly characters of all the tribes to Judah, enriched the latter nation in mural tone and character. This included all of the priests and Levlies who were still loyal to God and to the worship which he had established,


Encouraged thus, the young king began a general crusade against every idolatrous place and custom in his kingdom As Ahab exceeded his father Omri as an evildoer, so Jehoshaphat exceeded his father Asa as an upholder of the Divine Law. Indeed we remember that in Asa's later years he became proud and self-conacious and in a measure for a time rebellious against the Divine arrangements.
