ABOUT READY TO TURN ON POWER

Durham N. C., Sept. 14.—Arrangements have practically been completed at the cotton manufacturing plants of Durham for receiving power from the Southern Power Company and the current will be turned on about October 1st.

The machinery has all been placed in the substation and the branch lines to the different mills have been completed. The motors and other machinery have been placed in the mills and there remains only some slight work to be done on the transforming stations situated near the plants.

The construction force of the company is now engaged in constructing a line to Raleigh to connect with the plant of the Yadkin River Power Company and the two companies will co-operate with each other in supplying Durham and Raleigh with the energy.

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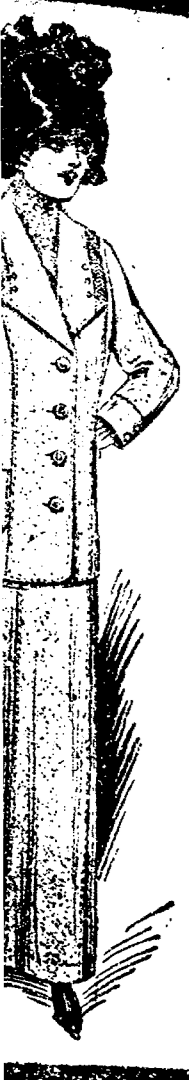

She was restrained, though, and much calmer, went to St. Paul's church, where the coffin was borne by Dr. B. K. Leon, J. J. Verliger, Joho Miller and Rawlin Mattson, all friends of the dead boy.

She sat through the service, calmly, and was calm during the long ride out to Mt. Olivet Cemetery. She was foremost by the side of the grave, but she stood calm while the drak clothed men whose shoes showed clay upon their soles, adjusted the web straps about the little casket and placed it over the grave.

Then as the little coffin began slipping downward the girl shrieked. She jumped for the open grave. Physicians and friends who had feared such an out break grasped her and dragged her backward from the yawning hole.

Her friends leaped back into the carriage and drove to another hospital in another section of the city. There they met with like refusal. There was but one thing to do.

Fate and circumstances that have grimly jessed through the whole sickening tragedy that has come over the lives of the Smiths was at word again this afternoon Myrtle Smith as much a victim of the slayer's fury as the young boy found dead, lies raving on a cot not a hundred yards away from the building, where the man charged with responsibility for this ruin is confined.

Causes of Poverty in New York

New York World.

Only two families in every hundred of the 1,573, which have been in the care of the Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor this summer, were brought to poverty through intemperance. The percentage goes against preconceived notions and is, indeed, surprisingly small. It should disturb that prosperous complacency which sees in poverty only or mainly the penalty of wanton misdeed. The association's report for 1909 showed that intemperance, imprisonment, desertion, "shiftlessness and inefficiency," all told, accounted for not 13 per cent of those brought to want.

The figures for that year showed that 65 per cent of the poverty was due to two causes—sickness and unemployment. This summer the two causes account for 68 per cent of the poverty noted, and 43 per cent, or nearly half, was due to sickness alone. Here are causes of misery which society can abate or largely remove and the economic evils of

which it can provide against through some form of insurance.

How Elijah Got To Heaven.

Richmond Times-Dispatch.

Just now the Charlotte Observer is engaged in an argument with the Rev. Dr. Jonathan Galloway, of the Associate Reformed Presbyterian church, about the style of conveyance used by the Prophet Elijah in his ascent to heaven. The Observer having declared as matter of fact that Elijah was transported in a chariot of fire, Dr. Galloway, who is a member of the board of directors of the Theological Seminary of the Seceders, asked for the proof, asserting that according to the Scriptures, "Elijah went up by a whirlwind into heaven." Per contra, as the lawyers say, The Observer insists that "it is a fact also that as Elijah and Elisha walked and talked there appeared a chariot of fire and horses of fire," and declares "Elijah disappeared, sitting in the chariot, and borne on the wings of the wind is a perfect picture to our mind."

We do not intend to mix up in this discussion further than to say, if The Observer would only live the Scriptures as it speaks the Scriptures, it would be a far better newspaper. We would add as its older and best friend that it should refrain as far as possible from fooling with fire. There will be time enough for that sort of exercise after it shuffles off this mortal coil. Besides, we are inclined to believe that Brother Jonathan knows more about Elijah than The Observer.

Destroys Two Acres in a Week.

Army worms have marched into Wake county. Road Supervisor Wiggs yesterday told how they destroyed two acres of cotton belonging to Mr. Hillery Johnson in Barton's Creek township. "Last Sunday," said Mr. Wiggs, "Mr. Johnson observed these worms on two or three stalks of cotton. Now they have eaten two acres and the ground is covered with them. The field puts one in mind of a large spider web."

Asked to describe the army worm, Mr. Wiggs said: "They are about an inch and a half long and about as big around as a broom straw. They are green with a black streak running up and down their backs." Mr. Wiggs stated further that these worms moved about with great energy, going from stalk to stalk, remaining at each long enough to strip it of leaves and leave it in a desolate, barren condition. Mr. Wiggs says that from personal observation, he considers that one way to break the invading march of these destructive pests is to dig a ditch around the field in which they are observed. After they have eaten up the leaves at their command they will move onward, but when they come to the ditch they will fall into it and cannot get out. The army worm is a problem and it is hoped that some effective way to eradicate them entirely will be devised.
