STRIKERS ATTACK MAIL TRAIN

New Orleans, Oct. 1.—A Sunday mob of between four hundred and five hundred strikers and union sympathizers attacked a mail train on the Illinois Central at McComb City, Miss., this morning in their frenzied effort to lay hands upon a carload of strike-breakers being brought to this city from Chicago. Many of the windows in the rear coach occupied by the strike-breakers were smashed and members of the mob tried to detach the coach from the train. None of the men was seriously injured. The men will be put to work by the Illinois Central.

Jackson, Miss., Oct. 1.—A carload of strike-breakers on their way to New Orleans over the Illinois Central were stoned by a mob as they passed through McComb, Miss., this morning. Windows were broken and several of the men were injured by broken glass or by being hit with stones. The men finally used the car seats to barricade the windows. A trainman in the yards here made the statement today that there were approximately seventy-five cars in the yards with knuckle pins missing. Who removed them is not known.

New Orleans, Oct. 1.—The only development locally in the strike situation was the organization of the carmen employed at the Agiers shops of the Southern Pacific. W. E. Bowen, general secretary of the Federation of Railroad Employees of the Illinois Central system, appealed today to all union men and sympathizers to respect the injunction issued by the Federal court against intimidation and acts of violence.

Atlanta, Ga., Oct. 1.—The burning of a wooden trestle 350 feet long near Douglas, Ga., and the reported flogging of a white fireman at Vidalia, Ga., were the only developments today in the strike situation on the Georgia & Florida Railroad, the firemen of which went out several days ago. Not a wheel moved today. Vice President E. L. Bemiss, however, gave out a statement tonight to the effect that full service would be in operation tomorrow with white firemen, amply protected from strikers.

It would have been as convincing in the end, besides extremely economical in the matter of ink and print paper.

At the afternoon session a telegram was read from Mrs. Longstreet postmistress at Gainesville Ga., widow of General Longstreet offering salutations. Addresses by Rollins, of Asheville on "Rural Delivery Service" by Flowers of Mt. Olive on "Needs of Thirdclass Postoffice," and an address by Inspector Bulla.

The Hon. Locke Craige of Asheville has announced his candidacy for the Democratic nomination for governor. It is well remembered that Mr. Craige was a candidate for this nomination when our present Governor Kitchen was nominated. It is also remembered how he went to Charlotte prepared to win but was defeated by the Kitchen demagogues. Present conditions would indicate that Mr. Craige will be nominated. But then we must bear in mind that he is first man we have heard spoken of for the nomination through the press, and many heated discussions, debates and editorials will doubtless bring a number of pie seekers into the ring.

Another Precinct Heard From

Hon. Jno. G. Shaw of Fayetteville formally representative in congress from the sixth district has made his troubles known to the Democratic party by announcing himself a candidate for Lieutenant Governor of our state. His friends, as is always the case, are very much enthused over the declaration and declare he comes from a section of the state which has been neglected by the Democratic State Convention.

Automobile Laws

We are publishing sections fourteen and eighteen of the automobile law of North Carolina. Which are two of the most important sections to operators of machines and the traveling public.

In these sections you see not only the duty of each but the penalty on failure to carry it out.

Sec. 14. If a vehicle drawn by a horse or other draft animals or a motor vehicle be overtaken by any motor vehicle, and the person in charge of such motor vehicle expresses a desire to pass it shall be the duty of the driver of any such vehicle or motor vehicle so overtaken as aforesaid to turn either to the right or to the left of the center of the wrought or traveled portion of the highway and give the person so making the request an opportunity to pass; but, in passing, the person in charge of such motor vehicle and the other male occupants thereof over the age of fifteen years shall give such assistance as they are able to the occupant or occupants of the vehicle they are passing, if assistance is asked, and in thus passing the chauffeurs, drivers or operators shall use all due care to avoid accidents.

Sec. 18. Any person violating any of the provisions of this act shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and any one who shall be convicted thereof or who shall plead guilty to any complaint for the violation thereof shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and costs of prosecution or by imprisonment not exceeding twenty days, or both; for the second offense or any subsequent offense he shall be punished by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars and cost of prosecution or by imprisonment for not exceeding thirty days, or both, and upon conviction for the third offense the certificate of such owner shall be canceled for the space of six months.

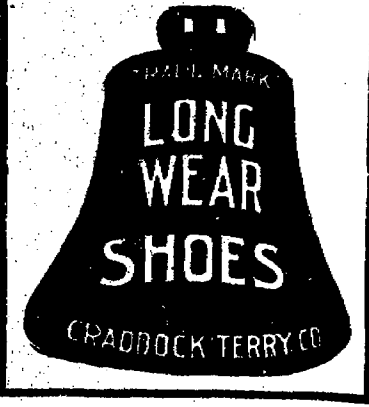

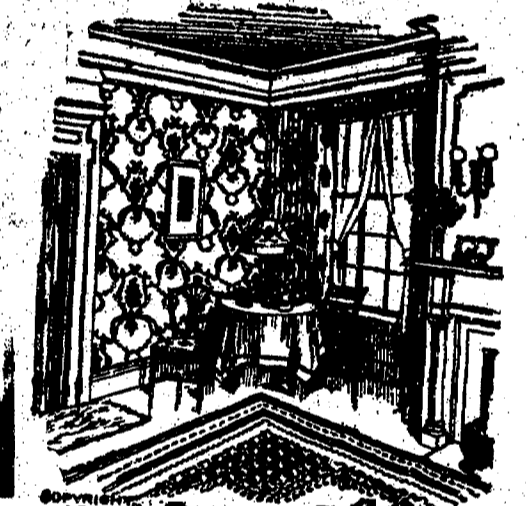
