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### ACQUITTED MAN FATALLY SHOT

Franklin, Tenn., Nov. 10.—After his acquittal of the charge of killing "Pink" Beard, Joe Beard yesterday was shot and fatally wounded in the courthouse by Henry Beard, prosecutor and brother of the man whose death caused the trial. J. L. Redford, constable, who was with the discharged man, was also shot. Joe Beard was a distant relative of the man he was charged with killing. The trial had been hard fought and bitter, due to a relationship of the prosecutor and the victim.

Just after Joe Beard had been discharged he and Redford left the courtroom, and when still in the courthouse Henry Beard fired at Joe Beard and hit him in the back. Redford was struck once in the breast. Redford fired one shot at Henry Beard as he fired, but missed. Henry Beard was arrested after a short pursuit by officers.

#### The Crops for 1911.

The final returns for crops issued by the Department of Agriculture considerably improve the situation compared with the prospect in August or September. The corn crop remains substantially as it was originally reported, and the reduction, about 13 per cent., leaves it tolerably certain that the price of pork and lard, now lower than a year ago, will be higher during the next twelve months on the average than in the past crop year. In potatoes, however, the yield, 281,000,000 bushels, is 47-

000,000 bushels less than last year and about 50,000,000 bushels less than the average, a reduction of about one-sixth, but better than was feared after the mingling of rain and drouth which cut into this important article of food. The yield of tobacco, 790,000,000 pounds, is also better than was anticipated, though about one-fifth below the usual yield.

The practical result is that while these crops are lower than last year and wheat about equal, the reduction is not so great as seriously to advance prices.—Philadelphia Press.

He was a Confederate soldier and had been a merchant. He was a devoted member of the Episcopal Church and has accumulated much property. He was three times married and is survived by a wife and six children.

Gov. Mann of Virginia will decide today whether or not Henry Clay Beattle, Jr., will be elected on November 24th.

Governor Blease of South Carolina has recently criticized the ministers of that state because they adopted resolutions against lynching. Who could expect more, Gov. Blease being of the political faith he is.

**Sees His Error.**

A prominent farmer the other day discussing the low price of cotton remarked: "I am satisfied that the price of cotton has been reduced more by the Democrats in Congress trying to revise the tariff on cotton goods than any other cause, while I have never voted anything but a Democratic ticket. Yet if the Lord will forgive me for my past sins, I will never vote a Democratic ticket again." There are lots of farmers that are getting their eyes open and will be found voting for the interest of themselves, their wives and their children instead of running after a gang of politicians who care nothing for them nor their families after they get their votes. —News Dispatch.

**Looking Forward to 1912.**

After a prolonged journey which led him through thirty states of the Union, and which reeled a railroad measurement in excess of 15,000 miles, the President returned to the national capital, and, as he himself declares, "rejoiced to get home from a trip in which I have had the pleasure of explaining, from my standpoint, some of the important issues of the day to many hundreds of thousands of

people." The President's frankly pleased at the cordiality with which he was everywhere received on the prolonged journey, and openly declares that from the close touch with the people and the opportunity which the journey afforded him of gauging popular thought and sentiment at close range he has derived much benefit. Before Congress assembles in regular session in December he will prepare his third annual message, and it is a safe forecast that it will be a message the more explicit in its conclusions because of the information gathered during the swing through the states.

And now that the President is back again at the home base, those who make it their main business in life to trace out cause and effect in the doings of the great actors upon the world stage will be readjusting estimates as to the probabilities of the national election year. General elections have been held in less than a dozen states, and in most instances the results hinged upon purely local issues. But it is generally conceded that in New York, New Jersey, Massachusetts and New Mexico the election results of this year do serve as indicators of the eddying tide of popular sentiment. This is so with regard to New York, because that state swings such an influence in national affairs that state elections in that commonwealth are always regarded as having a considerable significance with regard to the drift of sentiment in the wider field of national politics. The election in New Jersey was regarded as having a bearing in national politics because the Governor of that state threw his personality and prestige into the activities of the state campaign, he being looked upon as a prospective presidential candidate. The election in Massachusetts was made to possess a significance as pertaining to national issues because such questions were discussed in the preliminary campaign. New Mexico, in the first election, of course, indicate the status of popular opinion as regards affiliation with one or the other of the great national parties.

In New York there was a sweeping Republican victory. The 1911 legislature, which was Democratic by a large majority in the House and Democratic on joint ballot, will be succeeded by a legislature Republican in both branches. In New Jersey a Democratic legislature will be succeeded by a legislature Republican in both branches. In Massachusetts the full state Republican ticket with the exception of governor was elected, and the previous for Foss was reduced from over 30,000 to less than 9,000. It was anticipated that the election in New Mexico would be a Democratic sweepstakes. The prevailing impression had been that this new state was thoroughly Democratic in its sympathies and tendencies, and it, therefore, came as a complete surprise when the full returns indicated that a Republican legislature had been elected in New Mexico and that the two United States senators from that state will strengthen the Republican majority in the national Senate.

There is no reason to suppose that the election in Maryland was greatly influenced by national politics; neither was the election in Kentucky, nor were any of the various municipal elections. But those elections just previously referred to must be regarded as pointers in national politics for the reasons that are given. So regarded, they render the outlook, from a Republican point of view, so unobscured and clear that the most causal and unpretentious of prophets can make an accurate forecast. But the Democratic situation, beyond a doubt, is much more befogged than it appeared to be before the November elections were heard from. Prior to the November elect-

ions all the trustworthy indications sustained the conclusion that the altitude and record of the President upon questions at issue represented the views of his party in its popular and nationwide aspects. The elections have served to confirm that belief beyond the shadow of doubt. It is not now likely that there will be any other name suggested for first place on the ticket than that of William Howard Taft at the Republican National Convention which will assemble next year. It would be a presumptuous prophet, however, who would at this time undertake to predict positively the Democratic nominee. Those who have concluded that Dr. Woodrow Wilson was a long-sought-for Democratic Moses must have had their confidence rudely jostled when they perused the returns from the last Jersey election. Dr. Wilson had made speeches in every Jersey county, and his presidential aspirations were in common acceptance involved in the state election. It is not the Dr. Woodrow Wilson shadow merely, but Democratic presidential shadows upon the whole are looking much less impressive than they were before the November election results were available.

Shelby, Nov. 10.—Rev. B. L. Padgett, the holiness minister indicted under several charges for illegal relations with pretty Miss Carrie Stocton of Kings Mountain, was convicted of the most serious of the charges against him in the superior court of Cleveland county here to-day.

Padgett is a tall, rather handsome man with an intellectual face. He first knew the Stocton girl when she was a mere child, twelve years ago, and has been going to her home in Kings Mountain since that time.

There are other indictments standing against Padgett in Burke county and Greenville, S. C., both growing out of his relations with the Stocton girl.

During the trial here today, Mrs. Padgett and her daughter sat beside him and listened intently to the evidence.

FIRST HOPE THEN DESPAIR

Peking, Nov. 11.—The Throne and the Government alternate between hope and despair. This morning a telegram was received from Yuan Shi Kai stating that he is unable to come to Peking and expressed a pessimistic view of the situation.

Yuan Shi Kai said: "The outlook is decidedly gloomy. I do not expect to be able to effect the desired pacification. Moreover, my health is so feeble that I am unable to come to Peking and assume the post of Premier."

The expectation that General Chang Shao Tsen, who as real commander of the twentieth division of Imperial troops, holds the key to the situation in the North, might come to Peking and renew allegiance to the Government rested upon the assumption that he would meet in conference with Yuan Shi and Hsi Liang, former Viceroy of Manchuria.

Amoy, China, Nov. 11.—Attacks by robber bands threw the city into panic last night. The water patrol captured a piratical junk and the crew of sixteen men await decapitation.

Nanking, Nov. 11.—The Imperialists have regained supremacy in Nanking and the dragon flag again floats over the fort.

During the night the Imperial gunboats shelled in the Revolutionary camp. This morning troops making a sortie found the Rebel position, three miles outside South Gate, had been evacuated.

STREET CAR RUNS AWAY

Winston-Salem, Nov. 11.—One man was killed, three were seriously injured and eleven other passengers in a crowded runaway street car down the steep Salem hill sustained minor damages this evening at a quarter to six o'clock in a collision between the runaway, another car on the tracks and an ice wagon.

Starting above Shaffner's drug store, on Main street, in the heart of Salem, the wheels on the fog-dampened autumn leaves that strewn the track made control of the car impossible, and for half a mile it rushed down the incline with the motorman struggling vainly at the brakes.

All except Martin, Vose and young Pitts were able to go home. Courage marked the actions of the men, women and children in the car when they realized that they were in a runaway. Some of the most prominent citizens of Southside were aboard. Thoughtful passengers called out to everyone to be cool and not to jump.

Snyder met his death instantly by having his head mashed between the runaway and the standing car. He was on the rear platform and was caught when the moving car struck the other and caromed.

Ambulances, motor cars and other vehicles were hurried to the scene with physicians and the wounded were taken to the hospital. It was the first accident of so serious a nature in the 20 years' history of the car line here.
