Raise 571 Bushels of Corn to The Acre.

Dublin, Ga., Nov. 18.—Messrs. Mercer and Thomas have gathered their 12 acre crop of corn and find the yield per acre to be 1571 bushels.

This is the plot located on their farm near Tingle on which a wager of \$500 was made by J.E. Smith, Jr., through the Dublin chamber of commerce. No one took the wager up, although people from 12 states came with that purpose in view, but backed out when they inspected the crop. Messrs. Mercer and Thomas have demonstrated what the majority of Laurens farmers can do. They have gathered a record yield of corn from land that was, before they began to properly care for it, no better than can be found in nearly every section of the county.

It is astonishing how accurate is the aim of the amateur hunter when he mistakes a fellow creature for a deer.

White Man in Raleigh Forges Title to 104 Acres.

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Raleigh, Nov. 17. - Impersonating Marcus Martin, a lumberman of this county; forging the names of John W. Vick and his wife, Sallie D. Vick' to a deed conveying 104 acres os property; forging the name of Justice of the Peace Blake Stallings, of Little River township; having the deed registered in the courthouse and attempting to borrow \$1,500 on the land-these are the crimes charged up to an unknown white man who endeavored to pull off one of the slickest frauds ever reported in this part of the state. Had it not been for the shrewedness of E. P. Maynard, a lawyer in this city, the alleged imposter and forger would have got his money and somebody would have lost exactly that sum.

The story came to light yesterday when Marcus Martin, a white man, was arrested for the crimes. Martin was brought from Wendell to Raleigh and confronted with his accusers. "I don't know anything about," he said.

B. C. Beckwith, who drew the deed for the other Marcus Martin, said: "I drew the deed for Marcus Martin, but that ain't the man. I saw the other Marcus Martin Tuesday."

The prisoner was carried before Mr. Maynard, who declared "that ain't the man; I'd swear


