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A Hope Deferred.

[Hartford Courant.] With a whole winter before him, the President does not have to say all that he has a desire to say to Congress in a single message in early December. It isn't at all necessary—though, unfortunately, it has become customary—for the President to extend and distend his usual message with abstracts of the reports of his constitutional advisers, the heads of the executive departments. The honorable senators and the representatives can very well read the reports for themselves; indeed, that's part of the work for which the country pays them. We may add that in this era of newspapers, telegraphs, etc., they go to Washington in December much more fully informed as to the "state of the Union" than the members of the early Congresses did. For making them sit up and take notice of any specific policy or project of legislation the President may have specially at heart, there's nothing like the well-written special message; it hits the nail on the head and drives it home. The annual messages have been growing more and more voluminous for a long time now, and they have not gained in influence and effectiveness by their increase in bulk. A return toward the conciseness of the early presidents—or of Abraham Lincoln—would be a very welcome minor reform in this age of reform.

EXPRESS MESSENGER DEAD; SAFE LOOTED OF MONEY

Scranton, Pa., Nov. 17.—Between 8:26 and 8:30 o'clock tonight, Express Messenger Irvin G. Barger of this city was killed and the safe in his car looted as it sped between Taylor and this city on the Delaware, Lackawanna & Western road.

The train left North Cumberland at 5 o'clock. It made its regular stop at Taylor just to the south of the Scranton city line. Barger was seen by train hands during the minute that the train was stopped at Taylor. When the train arrived at the Scranton station at 8:30, four minutes later, Barger was lying dead in a pool of blood on the floor of the car, with his head battered in. Doctors later found a bullet in his brain. It entered at the base of the skull. His revolver, usually worn in a holster at his side, was found in the express safe, and the safe was looted. It is said that between \$1,500 and \$2,000 is missing.

The robber or robbers, it is supposed, got into the car at Taylor, committed the deed, and dropped off the train as it slowed up on entering the Scranton yards.

Barger was 45 years old and lived in South Scranton.

One Killed; 15 Fatally Injured in Collision.

Memphis, Nov. 15.—Fifteen men and women were fatally injured and one Jones, a negro woman, was killed in a collision of two suburban cars here this morning. The accident occurred in a heavy fog and neither motorman was able to see the other car.

REDUCE LIVING COST TO 7 CENTS A DAY

Cincinnati, Nov. 19.—For the week ending at noon today several young women, pupils of the senior class of the Cincinnati Kindergarten Training School, have conducted an experiment in dieting and claim the results indicate it is possible for a working girl with a knowledge of food preparation to secure good food at an average cost of 12 cents a day. It she cannot afford this, they say, she can get along nicely on as little as 7 cents a day, which is what the prospective teachers accomplished on their trial.

The girls were given a model flat, fitted up by the School Board; did their own housekeeping, marketed and prepared their meals, besides doing their regular class and special work.

Here is the 7-cent menu: Breakfast—Cornmeal mush and milk, brown bread or toast, coffee or cocoa. Luncheon—Peanut sandwiches, bread and jelly squares, fruit. Dinner—Split pea soup.

Mr. Morgan Has a Fall.

New York, Nov. 19.—J. Pierpont Morgan tripped in church today and falling to the floor, spilled the contents of the collect-

ion plate, which was piled high with money. The banker was uninjured.

Mr. Morgan, who is senior warden of St. George's Episcopal church, was about to pass the plate to Bishop Greer for the offertory benediction, when he stubbed his toe over a misplaced pew cushion on the floor just behind the chancel rail and fell on his hands and knees. Silver coins, bills and envelopes containing checks which Mr. Morgan had collected from the congregation were scattered over a wide area, and the silver plate, which he juggled with desperately for a moment, went rolling away.

R. Ruffeton Cutting, the junior warden, former Mayor Seth Low, a vestryman, and several clergymen were quickly at Mr. Morgan's side and the banker was soon on his feet again, unhurt he said and apparently not at all perturbed—in fact, quite the calmest man in the chancel.

The incident, witnessed by a large congregation, occurred in an interval of the special service commemorative of the one hundredth anniversary of the foundation of St. George's parish.
