





"I will answer that question," replied the South Carolina executive. At this point fully 25 women. some of them wives and daughters of governors, left the hall. Seeing this, Governor Blease subsided.

Gov. Albert W. Gilchrist, of Florida instantly uttered a sting-ing rebuke. "The first thing," he said "that indicates a manly man or a womanly woman is thoughtful consideration for other people.'

"One mob can do more injury to society." he said, "than 20 murders, because a lynching permeates the entire community and produces anarchy. The influence of mob rule is more reprephensible. When laws are made it should be the duty of a governorito enforce them, whether he approves them or not. When the law prescribes



Announcing that there has not been a lynching in North Carolina in six years, Gov. W. W. Kitchin said the sentlment for standing by the laws daily gains strength. He believed there should be convictions in nearly every case when there is a lyching.
