soon the sentences passed yesterday by the military commission following the trials of three men and holding up passenger trains.
 A fourth case was tried and completed today, but nothing has been made public.
 Reports are current tonight that the Federal government may take a hand in the situation.

The Federal grand jury convened today and is said to have considered the matter of holding up trains carrying mails.
 It is even rumored that Federal troops may take a hand. Two carloads of men were sent into the strike district tonight. The train bearing the alleged strike breakers was heavily guarded, a detachment of the militia being on board.

Gov. Kithin in Washington.
 Washington, D. C., Dec. 6.—Gov. W. W. Kithin reached Washington tonight and will attend the luncheon at the White House tomorrow which is to be given to the visiting governors. Josphus Daniels and wife are here.

TO HELL WITH THE CONSTITUTION CRIES GOV. COLE L. BLEASE.

Richmond, Va., Dec. 5.—Half of the 50 women in attendance on the governors conference this afternoon hurriedly left the hall when Gov. Cole L. Blease, of South Carolina, for the second time defending his doctrine of lynching negroes guilty of criminal assault, without a trial, shouted his platform "to hell with the constitution."

This sentiment was in response to a question hurled at him by Gov. Joseph N. Carey, of Wyoming, who desired to know if Gov. Blease had not taken an oath to uphold the constitution and laws of his state, and if these laws did not protect colored men as well as white men.

"I will answer that question," replied the South Carolina executive. "And I hope the newspaper men will get it right, for in my campaign in South Carolina they found that I am a fighter—and a cold blooded fighter," he added, grinding the words between his teeth. "When the constitution steps between me and the defense of the virtue of the white women of my state, I will resign my commission and tear it upon and throw it to the breezes. I have heretofore said: 'To hell with the constitution.'"

At this point fully 25 women, some of them wives and daughters of governors, left the hall. Seeing this, Governor Blease subsided.

Gov. Albert W. Gilchrist, of Florida instantly uttered a stinging rebuke. "The first thing," he said "that indicates a manly man or a womanly woman is thoughtful consideration for other people."

He was cheered. The greatest applause of the session had previously greeted Governor Carey's question. Later, Gov. John F. Shafroth, of Colorado referred to lynch law doctrine. "One mob can do more injury to society," he said, "than 20 murders, because a lynching permeates the entire community and produces anarchy. The influence of mob rule is more reprehensible. When laws are made it should be the duty of a governor to enforce them, whether he approves them or not. When the law prescribes hanging for an offense, and a man is found guilty, he should be hung, whether white or black, and there is no excuse for mob law. I conceive it to be our duty as governors to declare for law and order."

Papers read by Gov. Tasker L. Oddie, of Nevada and James H. Hawley, of Idaho, on uniformity in laws governing divorce were under consideration when Gov. Blease spoke. He defended the position of South Carolina where no divorce is permitted in any cause. He proceeded to discuss the race problem, and said that when an inferior race gets in the way of a superior race, the former is swept from the face of the earth. He reverted again to his pardon record, boasting that he had pardoned and paroled more negroes than all other governors of his state combined since 1876.

Announcing that there has not been a lynching in North Carolina in six years, Gov. W. W. Kithin said the sentiment for standing by the laws daily gains strength. He believed there should be convictions in nearly every case when there is a lynching.

Gov. Mann of Virginia, added that he would call out every soldier in this state if necessary to protect a man under arrest and give him a fair trial.

Movements for the improvement of rural life and the upbuilding of agriculture were discussed this afternoon by Govs. Adolph O. Eberhart, of Minnesota; Terbert S. Hadley, of Missouri; W. H. Mann of Virginia; George W. Donaghey, of Arkansas; and Joseph M. Brown, of Georgia. Divorce law problems were also spoken to Govs. Joseph M. Carey, of Wyoming and S. E. Baldwin, of Connecticut.

Miss Mary Johnston, the novelist, addressed the conference on equal suffrage.

It was announced that Ambassador Myron T. Herrick will be one of the speakers tomorrow morning on the subject of rural credits. He will personally represent President Taft.

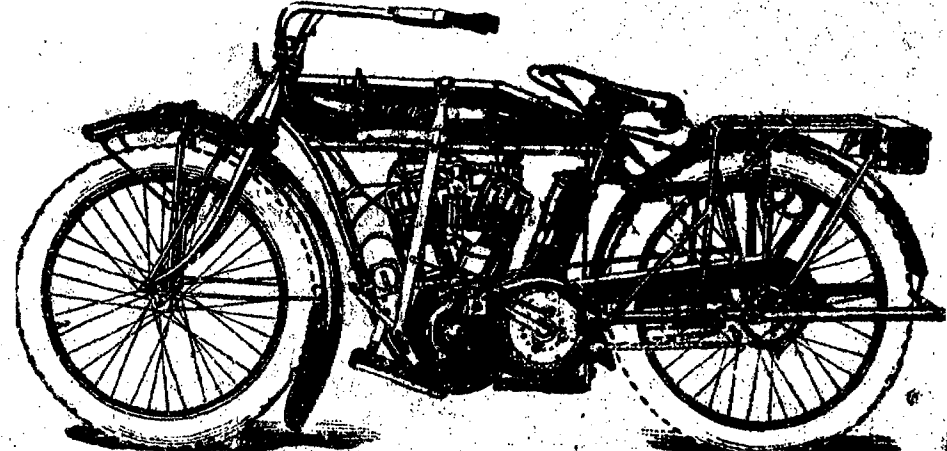

The salary system is now in force in Alamance for all county officers. So you will pay for recording all papers when same are filed.

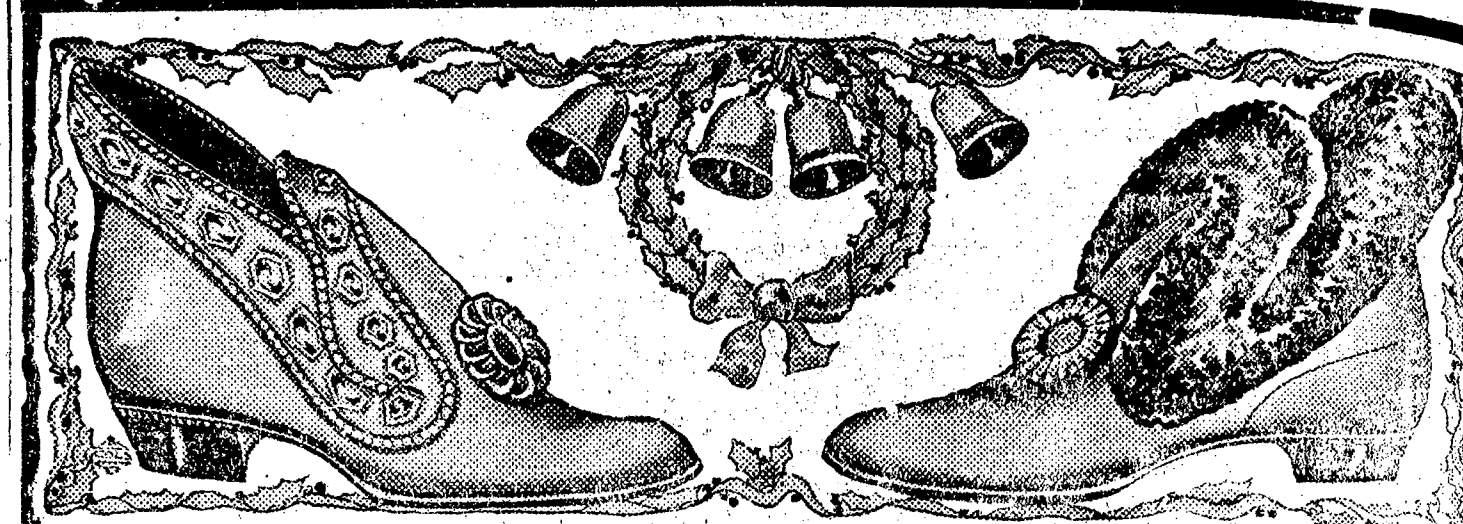
Democrats Hold Up Appointments

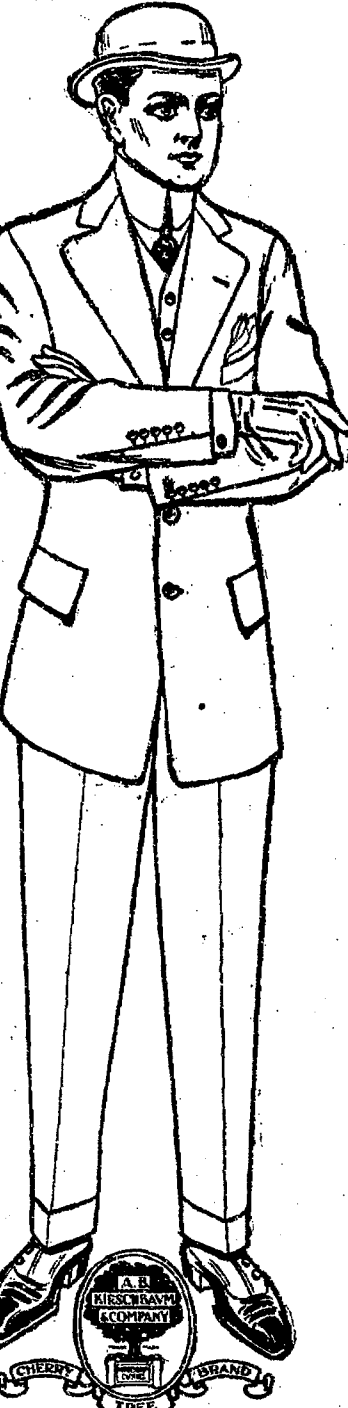

15,000 Killed in Philippine Typhoon.

Washington, Nov. 29.—That fifteen thousand people were probably killed in a typhoon that swept the Philippine islands last Tuesday was reported in cable dispatches to the bureau of insular affairs today.

Many Americans, it is feared, have lost their lives in the storm.

The typhoon swept the Visayas islands and is said to have practically destroyed Tacloban, the capital of Leyte, on the northeast coast of the island and to have wrought enormous damage and loss of life at Capiz, the capital of the province Capiz.

Several hundred foreigners are employed in the hemp factories of Tacloban, which is the outlet for a considerable hemp district, and has a population of 14,000.

Leyte has a population of 14,000; Capiz has a population of over 20,000. Capiz is the terminal of the railroad from Iloilo. It is a most important sugar point.

Mark Graves of Confederate.

General Berry's report will be transmitted to Congress. It shows that the General found and marked by headstones and tablets the bodies of 22,401 Confederate dead including all positively known to fall within the terms of the act. In every case where it was possible each of these graves was marked with a white marble headstone similar to those placed over the graves in the Confederate section of Arlington National Cemetery.

In cases where the identification of individual graves was impossible monuments were erected with bronze tablets attached giving the names and commands of those so honored.

A monument of character was erected at Point Lookout, Maryland, to mark the burial place of about 3,384 Confederates. Similar monuments have been erected by the Government at Chicago, North Alton Ills. Indianapolis, Ind; Finns Point, N. J; Philadelphia, Pa; Harrodsburg, Ky; Evansville, Terre Haute and Lafayette, Ind. and other places.

There are about 4,400 Confederates buried in Oakwood Cemetery at Chicago, about 2,400 at Finns Point and a smaller number at each of the other places named.

The graves marked with individual headstones number nearly 10,000, a large majority of them being in cemeteries in Elmira N. Y. Columbus O; Rock Island, Ills; Jefferson Barracks Mo; Springfield, Ills, and Madison Wis.
