### Tar Heel Elected

Nashville, Tenn., Jan. 24—Prof. W. R. Webb of Bell Buckle, Tenn., an independent Democrat, today was elected United States Senator for the term ending March 4 next. He defeated M. T. Bryan, Nashville, 73 to 53. Professor Webb's election came on the ninety-eighth ballot, his support coming from independent Democrats, Republicans and 11 Democrats from Shelby County. He will succeed Newell Sanders, Republican filling out the unexpired term of the late Senator Robert L. Taylor.

The Senator-elect is a native of Person County, North Carolina, and a graduate of the University of North Carolina.

### Murphy Partly Owns Park.

Cincinnati O., Jan. 24.—President Charles W. Murphy of the Chicago National League Baseball Club, announced here today that he had purchased a half in-

terest in the Philadelphia National League Baseball Park and that the park only—not the club—now is jointly owned by himself and C. P. Taft of Cincinnati.

At the recent sale of the Philadelphia club to William H. Lock and associates, an agreement was entered into by which the Philadelphia club owners could purchase the playing field in 1920 for \$100,000, Mr. Murphy said.

Manager Huggins, of the Cardinals, is arranging to spend a week or two of the training period at Knoxville, Tenn., provided suitable grounds can be secured. Knoxville has a good park, which will be available at that time so it is likely that the Cards will put in their training stunts there.

Outfielder Armando Marsans has accepted the Cincinnati club's terms. He is to be played in right field this season.

### 3 Brothers Marry; Brides are Sisters.

Manlius, Ill., Jan. 23.—A triple wedding, in which the brides were all sisters and bridegrooms all brothers, was celebrated here this afternoon, when Miss Mary, Annie and Jennie Laurie were married to Henry, John and Joseph Genuel.

The six persons had attended the same school. The young men are all in business in this town and when the three pairs became engaged it was decided to have one ceremony unite them all. There was a big wedding feast after the ceremony.

### Parcels Post Plans.

Washington, Jan. 26.—To provide adequate space for handling parcel post business it will be necessary to revise plans for many house buildings in which postoffices are located and negotiations to this end have already been instituted by Postmaster General Hitchcock. Today the postmaster general invited the supervising architect of the treasury and his assistants to cooperate in the matter with the building committee of the post-office department and the special parcel post committee.

At present 174 public buildings are under contract and 233 additional have been appropriated for by Congress. They approximate in cost \$50,000,000. The plans for these buildings have been prepared without regard for the needs of the parcel post system and it now is essential that changes be made in their construction in order that the increased volume of mail may be handled advantageously.

In 759 postoffices located in government buildings, it will be necessary to make alterations to meet the requirements of the parcel post. In some instances the purchase of additional ground on which to construct annexes will have to be made.

### Live Baby By Parcels Post.

Batavia, Ohio, Jan. 26.—Vernon O. Lyttle, a mail carrier on rural route No. 5, out of this place, is the first man to accept and deliver under parcels post conditions a live baby.

The baby, a boy weighing 10 pounds, just within the 11-pound weight limit, is the child of Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Beagle, near Glen Este.

"The package" was well wrapped and ready for "mailing" when the carrier got it today. Its measurements reached 72 inches the limit, and Mr. Little delivered it safely to the address on the card attached, that of its grandmother, Mrs. Louis Beagle who lives about a mile from its home.

The postage was 15 cents and the "parcel" was insured for \$50.

### Higher Water Predicted.

Washington, Jan. 25.—Higher water along the Mississippi river within the next fortnight is indicated by the condition of the Mississippi's tributaries, the weather bureau reported tonight.

"With the water now in sight in the Mississippi river," says the report, "a stage of about 18 feet is indicated for New Orleans by February 10. The following warnings have been issued for the smaller rivers; For a flood stage in the lower Illinois river in the next 24 hours; for a flood stage of 43 feet in the Tennessee river at Clarksville, Tenn., within the next 24 to 36 hours; a flood stage in the White river of Arkansas at Newport, Ark., within the next 48 hours; for a 39 foot stage in the Tombigbee river at Demopolis, Ala., in about three days."
