Strawberry Work.


North Carolina Experiment Station has been engaged in work during the season just passed that will be of interest to the strawberry growers of the state. In speaking of this work Mr. Hill says: "We are engaged in running a test under actual commercial conditions with a view of finding the actual cost of producing and marketing an acre of strawberries. This carry it on during a number of years in order that all factors can be studied thoroughly. We are also running a series of fertilizer tests in an effort to determine the amount and analysis of fertilizer to use to get the maximum results. Thirty-three tests are being carried on in this work. In our opinion the strawberry growers of the state are using fertilizer greatly in excess of the amount needed and all of them are not using the proper kind."

A Poor Method of Corn Breeding,

Some corn growers attempt to improve their corn by crossing it with one or more very different varieties. The object of such crossing is to combine the good qualities into one variety. It is not an unusual practice to cross a large-eared variety with a Yorkers gasped. prolific variety or a deep-grained variety with a shallow-grained corn, Such practice should be avoided. It not only produces a badly mixed variety, but usually fails to produce the desired results. Our varieties are already too badly mixed for the production of the best yields and quality of corn. If a variety has undesirable qualities which can not be corrected by straight selection, discard it and secure an established variety which has the desired qualities.
