



SAPE PARMING ALWAYS.

Outline of a Program Recommended by Government Specialists to Secure Safety in the Cotton Belt.

Washington, D. C., Nov. 4 .- A program of "Safe Farming" for the South is outlined in a circular which the United States Department of Agriculture has sent to bankers, business and farmers in the option states. The history of agriculture in the South as has been said, has been one of lean years and fat years. Short crops and high prices have almost invariably been followed by big crops and low prices and, in consequence, the farmer has experienced much distress. The increased attention which has recently been given to supporting the people upon the land has already resulted in much good, but there is some danger, it is pointed out, that, with the price of cotton rising, there will be a tendency for farmers to return to the old system of gambling on cotton. If the people of the South produced their own living, the circular points out, it would steady the whole system and keep the boat from rocking. The safety measures recommended are as follows:

First:-Produce a home garden for every tainily on the farm, the year round, paying special attention to a plot of Irish or sweet potatoes suffiof this character. Where feasible, have a patch of sorghum or other case to produce syrap for the family. Second:- Produce the corn neces-


